

Phonics - inflected endings

Comprehension: fact and opinion

Writing - not many kids like writing, but if you can make it fun and interactive, that makes it better. Grab a notebook and write back and forth to your child, go outside and write words in chalk on the driveway. Write and illustrate a story. Create cards for neighbors or to drop off at a nursing home. Let them type me an email, we'd love to hear from them!! Get moving! Go outside and play! Ride bikes, play outdoor games, jump on a trampoline. If you're stuck inside, play "the floor is lava," they love that! If you're stuck inside, put up a Just Dance video on YouTube or go to www.GoNoodle.com and set up a family account. We use these videos for brain breaks in the classroom, but they have longer dance videos, Zumba, Yoga, and inside recess videos that are all good exercise.


